I wrote some weeks ago about a review of the NSW curriculum being chaired by Professor Geoff Masters, CEO of the Australian Council for Educational Research. This review is the first comprehensive review undertaken since 1989. In thirty years so much has changed. As the curriculum needs to reflect the changing context and needs of its learners, it is natural that a fresh analysis of it, with a view to the future and its challenges, is timely.

I am pleased to say a number of our staff are contributing by writing a submission for the review team. I'm sure you would agree that it's important for experts on the ground to have input. Any parent wishing to contribute can do so online by googling "NSW Curriculum Review".

As well, representatives from NESA (NSW Education Standards Authority), the body that oversees the design and implementation of syllabuses, examinations, assessments etc, asked to speak with CHHS students about their views on what should be taught in schools. Twelve articulate, thoughtful Year 10s spoke for two hours with three NESA representatives on a range of issues, including the crowded curriculum and how students like to learn. I know that the NESA personnel were very impressed at the food for thought provided by these students.

Enrolments for 2020

As flagged with you on a number of occasions now, our enrolments will increase next year. I keep saying we will reach 1900 students. But I fear this is an underestimation. I suspect we will be closer to 1930!

Our next challenge for 2020 – 2021 will be the location of additional demountables. Four will be installed over this Christmas vacation with none of the student recreation areas sacrificed for this. But, after this year we will have to think differently. The challenge is: what will we sacrifice? Student playing areas or staff car parking areas? There are issues with both of these options.

Your thoughts would be appreciated. I'll certainly be discussing this with the P&C next year.

Thank you Ms Larnie Bedano, Year 8 Geography and Ms Jo Perkins – drought and fire

Ms Bedano's Year 8 Geography class has been studying the social impacts of drought on children in rural areas. Spending a lot of time researching the towns struggling, they chose Cobar Public School as a school to focus on as the bubblers in the school had to be turned off due to lack of water. With the recent closure of a mine and the subsequent loss of many jobs, our students felt an affinity for the area and students in this school. The class wanted to do something to support the children who would be having a very different Christmas morning to themselves with families unable to provide as many gifts this year. The aim was to buy a small gift and write a note to all children in the public primary and secondary school, 411 students in total. With a goal of raising \$4110 for a \$10 gift for every student, the class has raised nearly \$12,000, almost \$20 for each student with further money still coming. Support from local businesses and gift vouchers distributed to the most needy by Cobar Lions Club, this project has been so positive for everyone concerned.

Both Castle Hill Primary School and the Hills Council have donated many thousands of dollars, with the Mayor Michelle Byrne spending time with our students at Stockland Mall, raising \$1300. Olivia Wright in Year 8 and her father Mr Ian Wright have volunteered to drive the 15hr round trip to personally deliver the gifts to Cobar Public School at their final assembly. Ian's workplace has also raised \$1000, along with paying for the hire of the van and petrol.

Students have been working tirelessly for weeks, to collect this money and to purchase 411 presents in the next few days. Many have volunteered to help with the Christmas wrapping on Thursday afternoon,

There was amazing support from the community, with many on Saturday congratulating students on this initiative at Stockland Mall.

At the same time as this, CHHS launched a school donation drive to collect supplies for local fire fighters under the coordination and watchful eye of Ms Jo Perkins, our SAM. Supplies such as eye drops, Gatorade, protein bars, water, baby wipes and the like, were delivered to South Maroota Fire Station and Glenorie Fire Station on Monday 9 December. Donations will continue to be collected from our community up until 18 December. Can I particularly congratulate Ms Larnie Bedano and parent, Mr Ian Wright, who have been invaluable in their support and coordination of the rural project. Also, congratulations go to Ms Jo Perkins for her work in organising the drive for fire fighters.

On Tuesday 3 December, we had pleasure in welcoming 340 Year 6 students who will enrol at CHHS in Year 7 2020. Expectant and excited, they had a terrific day meeting their Year Advisers, Mr Ashok and Ms Wheatley, and their peer support leaders who will mentor them for the first part of 2020.


Thank You from the Library

Article: Spending time with kids: How much is enough?

The need to spend time with their parents differs for different kids. For some, there's no end to the time they'd spend with you. However, other kids feel differently. There's no right answer. I'm fortunate to have the flexibility that allows me to spend a great deal of time with my children. However, my nine year old daughter wants to spend more time with me. My eleven year old son, on the other hand, is content either way.

Australia ranks first

According to a recent study Australian parents rank number one among OECD countries (including most of Europe, North America, the UK and Finland) when it comes to spending time with their kids. The lion's share of this time is still invested by mums, but Australian dads are ahead of those from many other countries, averaging around 70 minutes a day with their children.

The source of misplaced parental guilt

According to research published in the Journal of Marriage and Family, not spending enough time with children is the biggest source of parental guilt in Australia.

The researchers also found that it's quality, not quantity of time children spend with parents that's important for their emotional wellbeing, achievement and behaviour for kids aged 3-11 years. The researchers concluded that volume of time doesn't matter. It's much more important how time is spent with your children when you are together. This in no way advocates for absentee parenting. It's about making the most of the family time you have and reducing feelings of stress for you if you can't be around as much as you'd like to be.

Here are some ideas to help make sure you optimise the time you spend with your kids: Create a tradition of one-on-one time with each of your kids around an activity that you both enjoy, such as a cafe catch up over a milkshake, shooting hoops or playing a favourite board game Read regularly to each other, as these are special times of connection, especially in bed at night Eat meals together as a family so you can all catch up and connect – this is worth its weight in gold when it comes to quality time

Pay attention to your children, watching for cues that they're in need of extra time with you Adolescents benefit from spending extra time with their parents. Through interactions with their parents teenagers can learn to make better decisions about their health, improve their academic achievement and experience better wellbeing

Take an interest in their interests. Connect with your children through the activities that they value such as music, sport or games, even if they aren't hobbies you don't normally enjoy. Your kids will appreciate you making the effort and will respond accordingly

Be present when you're with your kids. Research shows our minds can wander up to 47% of the time when we are with our loved ones. If you're present with our kids, you won't miss out on nearly half of that precious time.

Be mindful of the importance of unstructured time for kids. That is, time they spend playing alone or with siblings and friends. Play is essential for our kids' wellbeing and development. Play changes as our kids grow up but as long as whatever they're doing is child-led, it's play. This is the time to leave them to it.
