"My Strengths"

In a time of COVID, where mental health issues are rampant and general wellbeing has been compromised, we offered a program "My Strengths" to Year 10 students. Running for two days on Monday 16 November and Tuesday 17 November, the program centred on the idea that many students focus on their weaknesses, comparing themselves to others, leading too - often to feelings of discontent, low self esteem, even anxiety. The program gave students the opportunity to discover their strengths so they could better understand themselves to make choices to build self - esteem and develop a future that "fits them". Presenters had qualifications in psychology and counselling. I've always been a "Positive Psychology" fan, and coupled with enthusiastic and engaging presenters, we think we had a winner for students.

Students completed an online assessment where they ranked themselves on a scale of 1-10 against 50 statements, giving each a final result of 5 strengths, such as loyal, charismatic, creative and so forth. So. all students received pack personalised of а strength cards detailing their identified strengths and ideas for putting their strengths into actions. Students also took home a parent pack with information regarding support for these strengths.



Karen Street, one of our Head Teachers Teaching and Learning was the brainchild behind the organisation and administration of these 2 days, and for that I am very appreciative.

At a cost of \$6000, we believe the program was worth it. Any feedback from parents would be gratefully received.



Year 9 Peer Support – ready for action

We're gearing up for Orientation Day, done differently this year (of course). Our Year 9 peer support team is preparing for the induction of new year 7 students (2021) on Tuesday 1 December where "lots of 100" from the local primary schools will meet, and be greeted, for a virtual tour and some special treats. We are going to make them very welcome.

Student voice – it's important for planning

We continue to ask important questions of all stakeholders to ensure that our situational analysis for the coming development of the school's Strategic Plan for 2021 – 2024 is thorough.

Student voice is critical to this process. Cath Kenna , Head Teacher Administration took carriage of this by surveying 100 students from Year 7-11. She asked questions about additional programs we have to support students (everything from Hogwarts, Cherish, Rainbow Club, mentoring and the Maths Homework Club and more), relationships between students and teachers, "Challenging minds and building character", mental wellbeing and safety at school. Students gave very affirming answers to our many programs and had some terrific suggestions for improvement. They were clear that the school should do more on environmental issues, including climate change. In response to "What do you like about CHHS?" the top 5 were as follows:

- Staff and student relationships
- Culture and inclusivity
- Opportunities
- Classroom teaching
- Facilities

In response to "What do you feel we could improve?" the top 5 were:

- More toilets and change rooms (that's happening!)
- Seats and shade areas (that's happening too!)
- Faster internet in portables
- Improved student welfare (mental health issues were prominent for students)
- Modernise more classrooms

They make a lot of sense, don't they.

Deck the Streets

Following the success of last year's project where students from drought- affected Cobar were sent presents, the same worthwhile, if not more ambitious, thinking is going into a 2020 project, this time bringing some Christmas joy to homeless people in the streets of Sydney.

The boundless energy and focus of Larnie Bedano, a member of the Social Science faculty, is once again evident. She is the brainchild behind this project. Working with her Year 8 class studying liveability of people in Australia and the interconnections within our community, this team wants take on a real life problem, apply it to their Geography learning and at the same time practise kindness. Their aim is to provide a gift for 100 homeless people and to have these gifts distributed by a non - profit organisation working in the city. Initial thoughts include purchasing a container to store food (very practical) for each person and placing items inside the containers that will bring a smile (some indulgence, hopefully).

What a great idea. And what an appropriate end to a year that has challenged so many. Gratitude is an antidote to all that is difficult.

Reflecting on this made me realise it was more like a collective of experiences and opportunities that reassured me that PDHPE teaching was the career for me.

It's no secret that I love sport and in high school I was involved in as many school teams as I could be. Soccer was MY THING and I was a participant in a program at my high school called Football United. At 15, I joined the coaching team at Football United and helped facilitate the program at my school. I had just finished my HSC and with my sights set on studying PDHPE teaching at Sydney University when I was given the opportunity of a lifetime. We came together with over 20 other countries from the Pacific to discuss issues on health, education and social inclusion. I always knew that whatever I pursued I wanted to be in a position to make a difference in young people's lives. It was at this moment I knew that entering the world of teaching allowed me to have a meaningful impact on youth.

Sport is more than just physical activity to me, it can be used to explore personal development, community building and used as a tool for positive social change. I love that I can empower young people with the skills and knowledge to be physically and mentally healthy, promote personal safety, be resilient and make positive decisions.

Being Aboriginal Education Coordinator so early on in my career is something that I never imagined possible and I look forward to taking on my role as Year Advisor next year alongside Jodie Llamas. I am so grateful to begin my teaching journey here at Castle Hill High School where I am supported and mentored by amazing staff.


Design and technology year book


TRUER HISTORY














P&C News
