# Celebrating student achievement – Quality Morning Tea (QMT), every Tuesday recess. Role reversal!

One of the many, many positive aspects of Castle Hill High School is the celebration and sharing that occurs every Tuesday at recess – known as Quality Morning Tea. We've been doing this for decades and it never tires.

Each Tuesday, students from a selected faculty present their work, demonstrating to an audience of teachers across the school their learning and achievements.

This Tuesday for example, students from the Computing Studies faculty showed us their work on robotics and the coding required to develop their robots. It was fascinating. Students at the end were asked some probing questions from a captivated audience and without flinching were able to respond intelligently to satisfy their inquisitive on lookers.

This is quality work. What better way than to celebrate it with teachers across the school – with teachers as learners and students as teachers!

Bring on the ultimate robot, I say: driverless cars. I'm sure I will then not get lost so much.





#### We continue to learn - as we must

Ongoing, tailored, relevant learning that keeps teachers abreast of the times and thinking about other ways to live their work is critical. Unsurprisingly, professional learning for teachers is at the centre of our strategic plan for 2021 – 2024 (although, it always has been ).

Last Wednesday 10 March the school's executive and senior executive completed Part 1 with the incomparable Judy Hatswell, revisiting work of William Glasser on Choice Theory. Essentially this work is about building quality relationships and developing skills to manage oneself, knowing that the only person that any of us can control is our self.

Judy reminded us about connecting behaviours (listening, supporting, encouraging, trusting, respecting difference) and disconnecting behaviours (criticising, blaming, complaining, punishing). The work is complex, even though when I write this it seems so obvious, and simplistic even. The power of Choice Theory is in its practice where through questions we can empower the recipient to reflect on their behaviour.

Some questions we can pose for students are:

- If I say or do this right now, will it bring us closer together or will we end up further apart?
- Is it working for you? Is your behaviour giving you what you want?
- Is that behaviour your definition of success? Is this what you want to be?
- When I'm "feeling" I sometimes "spin". When I'm thinking, I'm calm. What does this mean for me when I am in conflict?

Our work in Part 2 next term will delve more into the powerful and reflective questions we can ask of students, or of one another, to build and strengthen enduring relationships.

# Past Students Achievement

Two of our very own, these two past students Imogen and Freyja Wadlow graduated from Castle Hill High School in 2012. They both then attended and graduated from Macquarie University with double degrees and triple majors. They travelled around Europe independent of each other a couple of times. Immie fitted in some air quality research in the UK, and Freyja volunteered at a seal sanctuary in the Netherlands.

Freyja is studying for her Masters in Environmental Science at Melbourne University, and Immie has just completed her Masters at Melbourne Uni in Atmospheric Science with one of the highest marks they've awarded in some time - her thesis was on the pointy-end of this area, looking at the influence of aerosols in big Southern Ocean weather patterns. She was delighted to tick off her bucket list item of travelling to Antarctica - she was onboard the Aurora Australis in-charge of looking after all the Australian science experiments onboard the icebreaker as it travelled to Mawson and Davis bases.

Immie's research field of atmospheric aerosols means she has valuable skills to lend to COVID research, and she's been happy to side-step her career to help out. She's currently finishing off around nine research projects looking at how the virus travels through hospitals and hotels. Her next plan is to complete a PhD in Atmospheric Science. Freyja is hoping to become an Environmental Consultant.

We love hearing about past students and their next chapters. We congratulate Immie and Freyja on their achievements and wish them luck for their futures ahead.

Parking Rules & Penalties

**Council's Compliance Officers enforce** parking signs at your school.

When it comes to the safety of vulnerable road users like school children, drivers found breaking the law will be met with zero tolerance. When an offence is detected, you will be fined.



#### **NO STOPPING**

#### You must not STOP at any time.

Stopping includes when the vehicle is not moving but the engine is still running.

#### **SCHOOL ZONE**



#### **NO PARKING**

#### You can stop only to drop off or pick

up passengers or goods and you must not stop for more than 2 minutes and The driver must stay within 3 metres of your vehicle. Stopping includes when the vehicle is not moving but the engine is still running.

#### SCHOOL ZONE



#### **BUS ZONES**

#### You must not stop your vehicle in a Bus Zone unless you are driving a public bus.

Stopping includes when the vehicle is not moving but the engine is still running.

#### **SCHOOL ZONE**



#### **DRIVEWAYS**

#### You must not park your car over or block

access to a driveway. You can stop in a driveway to drop off or pick up passengers BUT only for less than 2 minutes AND the driver must stay with the car.

## There are now increased penalties and demerit points associated with all offences in School Zones.



#### **NO PARKING**

You have no more than 2 minutes for drop-offs or pick-ups and must stay within 3 metres of your vehicle.

Penalty from \$194 and 2 demerit points



#### **NO STOPPING**

Under no cicumstances are you permitted to stop on a length of road to which a No Stopping Sign applies.

Penalty from \$349 and 2 demerit points



#### **BUS ZONE**

You must not stop your vehicle in the indicated zone unless you are driving a public bus.

Penalty from \$349 and 2 demerit points

Double parking

Stop on path or nature strip

Stop on / near marked pedestrian/children's crossing

Approach children's crossing too quickly to stop safely

Illegal U turns

Stop across driveway

Drive using a hand held mobile phone
