Year 7 Parent/Teacher Evening – Tuesday 27 April in Week 2

Early next term we will have pleasure in meeting Year 7 parents for the first time via a parent/teacher evening. Bookings for this event will be available to parents next term and communicated by Ms Jennifer Dane, the Deputy Principal in charge of Year 7.

We are going to do another ZOOM meeting as the first one for Year 12 this year was highly successful, notwithstanding some technical glitches that hopefully can now be overcome. We learned so much about the process. There were many advantages and these we felt outweighed the disadvantages. Feedback suggested that the one-on-one ZOOM meetings were quieter, more directly engaging and more private. Although, I personally felt a little estranged as I didn't get the opportunity to wonder and casually talk with parents, or in fact to address any immediate issues from parents as I normally do in a conventional parent/ teacher night. Relationships are critical — and you have to be able to speak to people, or be visible at least, if a relationship is to develop. But I am assured that there will be a way for parents to access the senior executive via ZOOM (Drop-in ZOOM is what it is apparently called!) so we will give it a try this time.

Your feedback on another ZOOM parent/teacher evening will be eagerly sought. Although the organisation for ZOOM meetings is more challenging for us, we will coordinate this if it is a better way to communicate and if parents and teachers prefer this.

I very much look forward to your views on the matter after 27 April.

Mini Workshops for Year 7 in PC

Cyber safety is, more than ever, an important part of learning for students, as I'm sure parents would agree. Year 7 have been introduced to some bite - size tutorials in PC on the importance of being careful in online chat rooms, what to do and where to go if suspicious, cyber bullying issues, ethical, respectful language when chatting on social media, and so forth.

Of course we will continue to focus on more in-depth material for students as the weeks and months go by.



School Improvement Plan

The department of education changed the process for the development of schools' directions and focus areas last year. And so, the 2021 – 2024 strategic plan (known as SIP – School Improvement Plan) has emerged. You will recall you were part of our "situational analysis" where all stakeholders were asked for their evaluation and feedback on our work and future directions. We also considered a lot of hard data on HSC results, NAPLAN, attendance, wellbeing.

The result is that the plan for the next four years is highly targeted and "sharper". Even so, our vision to "Challenge Minds and Build character" in an environment where respect and excellence are at the fore is an enduring one that has been the bedrock of this school for a number of years. In summary, there will be three directions over four years:

- Student Attainment and Growth
- Strengthened Teacher Capacity
- Wellbeing

I don't think you will be surprised by any of the elements and detail in the SIP. Although, a feature of this plan which is unlike other plans from previous years is a greater focus on mental health and wellbeing issues. It will come as no surprise as this is an area of concern right across society, in all jurisdictions, age groups and countries. We will be working with teachers and students to identify strategies for better wellness and coping strategies for when things get tough.

A full copy of the SIP will be available on our website soon.

Those toilets – where are we at

I can confidently say that the new, additional toilets for students will be completed by 30 June this year. We will assign these toilets for seniors and the current ones for juniors. I'm so pleased with this, as Year 12 will get to experience them before they leave.

A COLA

I'm also pleased to announce that today I have given official approval for the commencement of the tendering process for a COLA to cover the main quadrangle. By utilising the government's "50/50 deal" (up to \$500,000) we were given an additional \$250,000 to top up our savings of \$500,000. At an approximate cost of \$750,000 a COLA is a major addition to our school providing shade, recreation, comfort during assemblies and outdoor learning spaces – as well as covering a decidedly ugly area of the school. I am hopeful that this project will be completed by the end of the year.

Science and Technology Challenge

Year 10 students participated in the regional Science and Technology Challenge recently. This was an opportunity to undertake such challenges as bridge building with other students from schools around the district. Pleasingly, students were ranked second, but really the experience of "challenging the mind" was the most enduring memory of the event for participating students.

End of term

This has been a very settled term with students very much on task and steady with their work. After a tumultuous 2020, this is such respite for students and teachers.

I'm off to Brisbane a little earlier than the last day to tend to family and assist with little Freddie who is still in hospital (100 days and counting!). We remain hopeful.

I am grateful that our wonderful librarians have recommended some fabulous teen literature for me to read, including "The Knife of Never Letting Go" by Patrick Ness. I hear that this book is sensational. Anyway, it's important to read quality literature that appeals to young people and engage in conversation about it. Both Kate Mathews and Lisa Roberts, our terrific librarians, run a book club from the library. I just might have to join.

My Story

I feel like I don't have an exceptionally interesting story to tell of why I became a teacher. All I thought I wanted from life when I graduated was that "I was definitely not going to be a teacher".

My first degree was sociology, which followed my favourite subject at school 'Society and Culture'. Being the type of person I was, I thought I wanted to do social work, but I became sure it wasn't going to be a good career for my own wellbeing. After a while considering my options, my brother helped direct me into the path of education, where I was sure I could still help people without being involved in every part of their lives.

- Taylor Hills (Year 7) scored 1 goal




Overall, the U15 girl's football team smashed their first game and are keen to take down whoever else decides to go up against them.






























Science and Engineering Challenge
